We Can Do That!


Last month we received a letter from a Campbell owner, Richard Rose, who is enjoying boating on Lake Michigan with his 28' flybridge. He wrote to ask if we could fill him in on the history of his boat. But we were fascinated by the history of the boat as he told it and I quote:

'Originally we found our Campbell laying on its side in the desert sand with no trailer and, after tunneling under the boat in three areas, we were able to rent a crane and lift the craft onto a low-boy transport and bring it home where we put it in drydock. After doing some research, we contacted R&S Trailer Co. in Lake Havasu and arranged to have them use their original patterns and make us a new trailer for our trek across the United States to Wisconsin. The trouble is, we know very little about the boat's past, although the people we purchased it from originally said it spent time on Lake Mead where it was "run hard and put away wet." The original brochures and all paperwork were still in the boat. The sinks and head still had the stickers

on them and have never been used. We'd like to restore the boat to original specs, but since there is not another Campbell boat up

here, we rely on pictures in the "Shoreline." Thank you for any help you can give us."




about the boat's past, and an interesting one it is. In 1976 (in the height of our boat-building glory), we were contacted by a rep who had connections in Kuwait. He said that a Kuwaiti group was shopping for 1000 boats of different varieties. All the boats in our group were to be made in the U.S. and our main competition was a similar group in the Netherlands. Our part was for 50 28' flybridge cruisers and so we built two as samples. Unfortunately, our Kuwait "family" apparently was not as powerful as the family backing the Netherlands, so they got the contract and we sold those two boats, which we nicknamed "Kuwait I and II." Richard Rose owns "Kuwait I" which was a rust-colored flybridge built in July of 1977, and was extensively pictured in our "white book" catalogue. (see photos)

The boat was sold to Beany Walker whose son removed the flybridge but never got around to moving the controls. We never heard much about the boat until Richard got in touch with us. Strange that a boat that was built for the desert and found in the

desert is now adjusting to life in Wisconsin! The "flying Phoenix bird" which he described on the engine cover was the motif suggested to appeal to the Kuwaitis. We will be sending Richard all the information we have to help him restore the boat to its original condition.

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

After the election on Sept. 10, we will be having a Campbell-style party at the shop to celebrate whichever of the three possible outcomes occurs; win, lose or draw (with a runoff in November). You may have been hearing some discussion about the temporary banning of personal watercraft on the National Park Service-administered Lakes Powell, Mead and Mohave. The San Francisco-based Bluewater Network filed a lawsuit two years ago to mandate that the Park Service

prove by Sept. 15, 2002, that PWGs do not harm the environment, a tack and deadline that they knew the NPS could not meet. Naturally the Park Service was unable to accomplish this within this time frame, so a ban will go into place on Sept. 15 until that report is completed. The Bluewater Network has also sought to ban camping on many of the most popular beaches, and the closure of entire coves and canyons to boating.

While Lake Havasu is not yet affected, as it is not administered by the Park Service, the concern is that the ban on PWCs is just a foothold and the ultimate goal of the Bluewater Network is to ban all motorized marine vessels. Since power boats are not vulnerable on the "emissions" issue, they will do this by attempting to enforce the current sound level limits. These are set low enough that virtually no boats over 24' can comply (thus explaining why it has never been enforced). The explanation for Bluewater's attitude (and its extensive funding for legal action) may be explained by the fact that the largest contributor by far is Ted Tuner, a sailor and "rag man" for years.

As of yet we have no idea what the impact of this ban will be on Lake Havasu, other than we may see a lot more PWCs. Of more concern to all of us who love boating is what will happen to this issue in the future. Keep an eye out for future developments.

We have completed the restoration, or more correctly, complete reconstruction of our turbocharged 20 Daycruiser. After some soul searching, Judy and I have decided that MISSY, SNOOPY, and the LIMO are enough boats for our personal fleet, and we are offering the FLAGSHIP for sale. It is a great boat with a lot of good memories, so give us a call if you're interested in learning more.
